This is why a national time of honest appraisal of ourselves is so important. It is much more than being critical of others, our culture, or the state. It is about ourselves. What are our 'fibs' that shape how we face the world, ourselves and ultimately God. This is what Lent is all about, a chance to look at ourselves, as our ancestors in the faith did, honestly and with integrity. A big task.
