23<sup>rd</sup> Week of the Year. Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> September. Readings: 1 Corinthians 7:25-31; Psalm: 44; Gospel: Luke 6:20-26.

When I was a boy I remember seeing on television in black and white the outbreak of World War Two. People sitting in their homes listening to the radio as Neville Chamberlain announced that we were at war with Germany. I was fascinated by wondering just how they must have felt. I knew the outcome and all they had to go through to reach victory. But how must they have felt? It is a cliché now that our, once in a century, pandemic we have just gone through, is like wartime, with everyone mobilised to win the battle with it. We have to think somewhat in those terms to understand what was happening to the Corinthians and just what Paul was trying to say. The Corinthians were looking to this strange man who talked of the end of the world as they knew it. Some were tempted to just enjoy themselves and throw away all inhibitions. Paul must challenge them about what the coming kingdom was about. How they had to live as if it was already here. His advice has stood the test of time, we are to live in expectant faith. The Lord is coming, be there to meet him.
